- **Larry ROTHSTEIN :**

He came from the Department of Political Science and the Schmidt Labor Research Center at the University of Rhode Island. He is a lawyer as well as a political scientist. The path that has led me to international comparative research on genetic privacy issues really began with my first stay at LEST with a NSF/CNRS grant (1981) where he was researching the legal and political aspects of the massive layoffs in the U.S. and French steel industries during the late 1970s. The contacts he made among researchers and trade unionists led him to look at issues regarding the supervision and control of workers and he began to look at issues involving autonomy and privacy at work.

His current research focuses on the legal and ethical issues regarding privacy in the workplace and in daily life. He has done comparative work in France, Italy and the U.S. Most recently I have been working on the privacy of genetic information. Under a Human Genome Project grant, he led a research team looking at the ethical concepts driving state and federal legislation protecting privacy and prohibiting discrimination on the basis of genetic tests and information. He worked at LEST and INSERM during several weeks in April.
